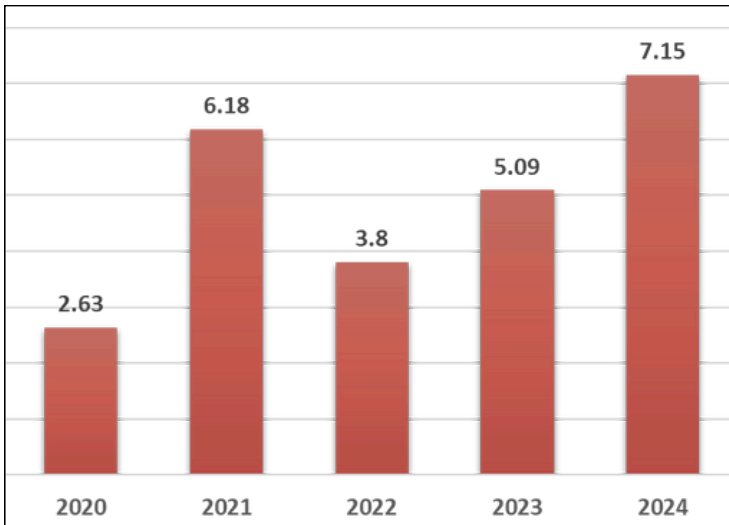

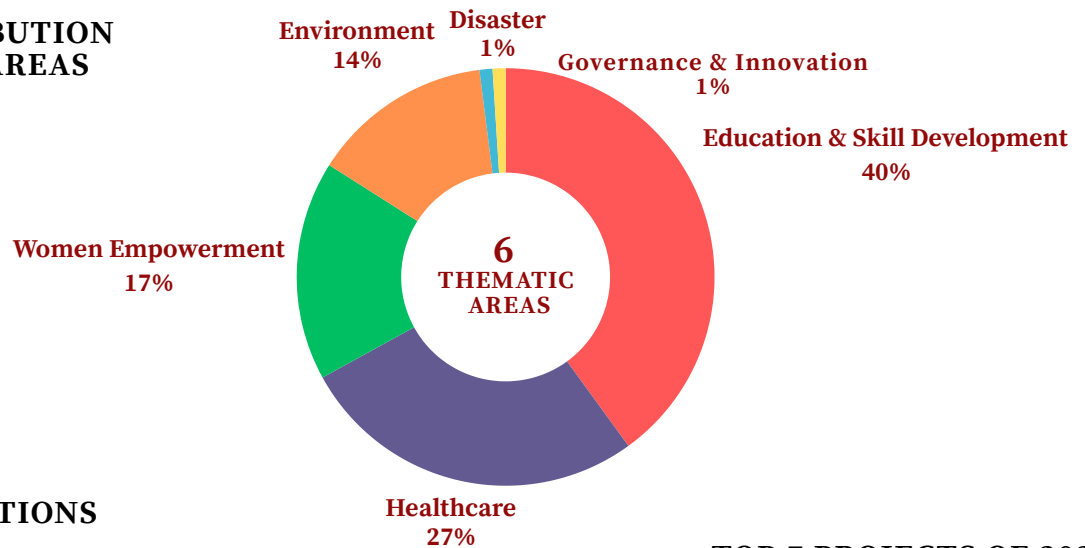

Education and Life Skills to Empower Tribal Girls

Shiksha Bharati (SB), an educational institution, runs a C.B.S.E.-accredited senior secondary school on a 20-acre campus in Hapur, Uttar Pradesh, about 40 miles east of Delhi. With IDRf's guidance and financial support, SB constructed a well-equipped dormitory, *Banwasi Chhatrawas*, with a capacity to house 101 girls within the campus of *Srimati Bhahma Devi Saraswati Balika Vidya Mandir*. Together, we provide completely free education, medical expenses, boarding, lodging, travel to hometowns during summer vacation, and field trips to historical and cultural sites to the tribal girls residing here. Girls from tribal villages of the Northeastern and other states of India are selected by Vidya Bharati and sent here for schooling.



258 TRIBAL GIRLS HAVE BEEN SUPPORTED BY IDRf

IDRf supports the girls' education through **endowment seats or annual support, scholarships, and recurring expenses** (staff salaries, maintenance, and addition of new facilities to the IDRf Hostel).

IDRf also supports higher education or vocational courses once the girls complete their schooling.

In 2020, with the vision and support of Dr. Emmanuel D'Silva, an environment specialist and World Bank retiree, IDRf set up two eco-friendly biogas units at the IDRf tribal girls' hostel to meet the cafeteria fuel needs and replace at least 57 LPG cylinders per year.



A donor in memory of her sister donated generously to IDRf to help set up the **Monica Gautam Tailoring Center** (in 2021) and the **Monica Gautam Computer Training Center** (in 2022) on the SB campus.

Free six-month courses are offered at these centers to improve the employability skills of the students and marginalized young women from nearby areas.

MISSION AND STRATEGY: 1

ASHWINI IS A YOUNG GIRL WITH A CLEAR VISION FOR HER FUTURE AND ATTRIBUTES HER CONFIDENCE AND SUCCESS TO THE OPPORTUNITIES PROVIDED BY IDRF AND SB.



Ashwini Limboo comes from a little village in Sikkim. It was quite difficult for her mother to raise her children when her father passed away. Ashwini learned about the selection process for free education at SB and applied for it. Due to her excellent academic records, she was selected for the program, but her mother was apprehensive about sending her so far away from home. However, after learning about SB's excellent education, discipline, nutritious meals, and mentoring programs on its secure campus, she finally agreed.

Currently in the ninth grade, Ashwini excels academically and in sports, winning multiple medals. Utilizing the career counseling provided, she has made the decision to pursue a science degree and apply for medical school after graduation. She aspires to return to Sikkim as a doctor and serve the poor.

“If Shiksha Bharati and IDRF hadn't supported me, either my mother would have married me off at a young age, or I would have ended up working as a farm laborer. This opportunity has given my family and me a new ray of hope.”



In 2024, IDRF conducted an external Impact Evaluation of SB to measure the effectiveness and sustainability of support in the long run. The Impact Evaluation was proposed with the objective of enhancing an internal operational learning to improve long-term strategic planning and project implementation, and accountability to provide transparency and reporting to our donors.

MISSION AND STRATEGY: 2

Empowering Underprivileged Women through Vocational and Skill Development

IDRF is committed to providing women with skills that improve their **employability** and **self-sufficiency**, acknowledging that **economic independence** is essential to **social upliftment**.

The vocational training initiatives aim to:

- Provide **marketable skills** in various trades.
- Enhance their **confidence** and ability to secure **sustainable livelihoods**.
- Promote **entrepreneurship** and **financial independence**.
- **Bridge the gender gap** in employment opportunities.

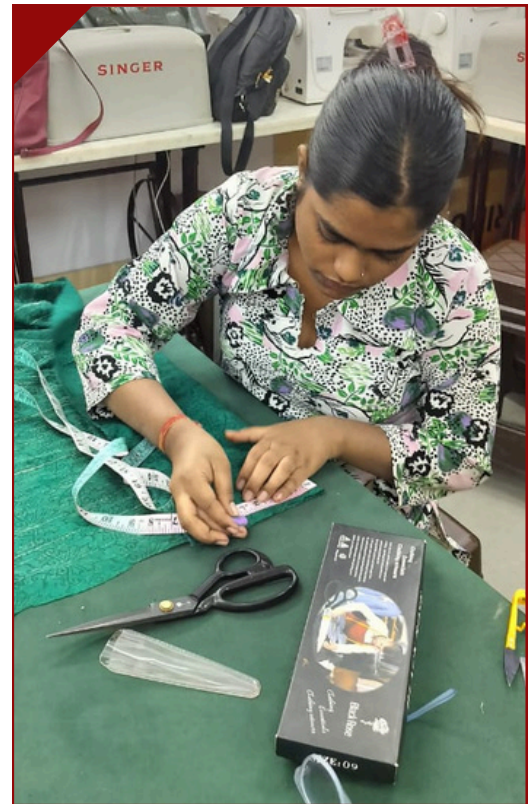
IDRF offers training in diverse fields, including:

- Tailoring and Handicrafts, Beauty and Wellness, Computer Literacy, Healthcare and Nursing Assistance, Agriculture and Sustainable Farming, Food Processing and Catering, Retail and Entrepreneurship, Home-Based Businesses such as making bangles, bags, brooms, *kurtis*, quilts, pickles, and papadum, etc.

These programs are designed to help impoverished women become self-sufficient and economically independent, and the majority are either free or have extremely minimal costs.

IDRF collaborates with local NGOs and community leaders to identify the specific skill gaps and employment opportunities in different regions. IDRF helps establish **training centers** in rural and urban areas, equipped with the necessary **tools** and **resources**.

Training programs are tailored to meet local economic demands, ensuring that women gain skills that are relevant and marketable. The implanting NGOs partner with local businesses and industries to facilitate job placements and entrepreneurial opportunities. This structured approach ensures that women not only acquire skills but also gain economic independence and long-term sustainability.



More than 1,500 women in Delhi, Haryana, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, and Sri Lanka have had their lives changed by IDRF by giving them the means to end the cycle of poverty.

The skill training programs have had a significant impact on the local communities of the beneficiaries by creating employment opportunities for others as well. These training programs foster gender inclusivity, enabling women to enter traditionally male-dominated fields like commercial driving, automobile repairing, and electrical work.

1. EDUCATION AND SKILL DEVELOPMENT

BROADENING PERSPECTIVES AND LEARNING THROUGH NEW EXPERIENCES

Auroville Unity Fund, Tamil Nadu

IDRF supports a variety of summer camps designed to provide underprivileged children with academic and enrichment opportunities they wouldn't otherwise have access to.

29 children embarked on a 15-day journey to Delhi, Agra, Vrindavan, and Nainital. Along the way, they explored historical and cultural landmarks, took part in yoga and meditation, and participated in adventure sports and theater workshops.

IDRF provided a brand new multipurpose van to Kaliyuva Mane- a residential school for children with learning disabilities for easy transportation to activities and medical appointments.



55 students in rural areas of Tamil Nadu receive meals and snacks every day of the week from IDRF. Additionally, students who need more nutritional help can take home extra meals. Daily oral hygiene services for everyone and routine blood testing for those who are extremely malnourished are also offered.

In Kaliyuva Mane, in the rural outskirts of Mysuru City, Karnataka, IDRF provides meals and snacks to more than 100 students and volunteers.

3. WOMEN AND COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT

ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT AND SKILL DEVELOPMENT FOR YOUNG WOMEN Sewa Bharti, Delhi



IDRF assisted with founding the "SOPAN" training facility, which provides 6-month courses in Beauty Culture and Fashion Design to economically weak women in the *Paharganj* area who want to become both professionally and financially independent.

CERVICARE INITIATIVE: PROTECTING WOMEN AGAINST CERVICAL CANCER Arpana Research and Charities Trust, Haryana

Cervical cancer is still a leading cause of death in rural India, especially where stigma, lack of awareness, and poor access to healthcare go hand in hand. We have implemented a cervical cancer prevention program to help raise awareness, provide early detection, and promote the use of simple and efficient methods for detection.



ACROSS 103 VILLAGES:

378 women screened for symptoms
154 women tested for cancer
37 women referred to hospitals for urgent care

4. ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

GOING GREEN AND LOWERING ELECTRICITY EXPENSES Shri Nilkanth Samaj Seva Trust, Gujarat



With assistance from IDRF, a 40KW rooftop solar power plant was installed on a 750-student *Gurukul* (residential school) building .

The electricity is also provided to the newly constructed prayer hall, kitchen, and cow shelter (*gaushala*).

As the school prepares to grow to 1,000 pupils soon, the solar plant is assisting in lowering carbon footprint and electrical costs.

EMPOWERING MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES IN WATER RESOURCE MANAGEMENT Samerth Charitable Trust, Chhattisgarh and Gujarat

Since 2009, IDRF has been supporting Samerth in the construction and revival of water structures in 115 rain-deficient villages that have reaped immense benefits to the tribal communities who are otherwise living in distressed situations and engaging in difficult work conditions.

With the increased availability of water, seasonal migration has gone down for 3,000 families in the past 10 years.

5. GOVERNANCE AND INNOVATION

PREVENTING AND RESPONDING TO GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE IN RURAL AREAS Partnership for Transparency Fund, USA and Center for Advocacy and Research, Rajasthan

IDRF is funding a three-year project (2022-25) that aims to address Gender-based Violence at the grassroots level, focusing on 20,500 women in 33 villages across 10 Gram Panchayats in Ajmer. The first two phases gave women's forums access to socio-development programs, such as livelihood projects that support survivors in their fight for justice. In the third phase, a collaborative government and women-led GBV reduction response structure has been established within the Panchayat Samiti and Block Administration.

Key Outcomes Achieved:

- safety infrastructure installed: street-lights & CCTVs
- self-defense training
- livelihood schemes
- helpline numbers displayed in public vehicles
- training on sexual harassment in workplaces
- setting up a Violence Response Committee
- gender responsive policing training at Police Stations to 10 Gram Sakhis, 99 Suraksha Sakhis, and 5 Women Desk Staff

EMPOWERING MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES BY FACILITATING ACCESS TO ENTITLEMENT DOCUMENTS AND GOVERNMENT SOCIAL SECURITY SCHEMES Samerth Charitable Trust, Gujarat

Members of the Parkar Koli community live in abject poverty and work as agricultural laborers or daily wage earners in the Kutch district. Since 2022, IDRF has helped provide Aadhar cards, Voter ID, Ration cards, bank accounts, and other documents to 1,500 villagers to access government benefits, healthcare, education, and livelihood opportunities to improve their quality of life.

Phase 1: November 2022-April 2024
794 families in 34 villages

Phase 2: June 2024-November 2024
706 families in 27 villages



IDRF has provided microloans for creating local employment opportunities for the Parkara Koli community, helping them start enterprises aligned with their skills.



Samerth Trust is training young volunteers from the community to help secure widow and old-age pension plans.

6. DISASTER RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

IDRF has been a pillar of support for disaster-stricken communities, providing timely aid and long-term rehabilitation assistance. IDRF and partner organizations step up to bolster the efforts of local authorities, offering resources, expertise, and manpower, preventing an overlap in their efforts and ensuring that aid reaches the most underserved areas. Beyond immediate relief, it focuses on rebuilding lives by supporting healthcare, livelihoods, and sustainable development programs, ensuring affected families can regain stability. These efforts highlight IDRF's commitment to turning disasters into opportunities for sustainable development.

KERALA FLOODS AND LANDSLIDES, JULY Manav Seva Sansthan

Relief efforts supported **200 families** in the Wayanad district by distributing hygiene, shelter, and back-to-home kits, including tarpaulin sheets, buckets, soaps, sanitary napkins, blankets, emergency lights, water filters, essential kitchen items, etc.



Karuppan, a 60-year-old daily wage earner, carries the responsibility of providing for his wife and four children. Among them, one daughter requires constant healthcare, a challenge that has stretched the family's resources.

“The relief and recovery kits from IDRF and MSS met our immediate necessities and also helped us rebuild and resume life after the floodwater receded.”

This story is a testament to the resilience of individuals facing crisis and the profound impact of timely assistance. As communities work to recover, continued support remains critical in restoring livelihoods and ensuring a hopeful future for those most affected.

GUJARAT FLOODS, AUGUST Samerth Charitable Trust

Essential items, including ration kits, tarpaulin sheets, mosquito nets, chlorine tablets, and solar-powered lamps to **300 families** in the Kutch district.

BIHAR FLOODS, SEPTEMBER Gram Vikas Parishad

110 families in Madhubani and Supaul districts were provided tarpaulin sheets, mosquito nets, solar lamps, and 14 days' worth of **dry food items** (such as wheat, cereals, sugar, oil, masalas, lentils, etc.).



ODISHA CYCLONE, OCTOBER Youth for Social Development

In cooperation with governmental agencies, IDRF assisted **pre-cyclone preparations** and distributed relief supplies and education on **Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH)** to **250 families** in Kendrapada and Bhadrak districts.

TAMIL NADU CYCLONE, DECEMBER Udavi School, Auroville Unity Fund

The school site sustained significant damage as a result of the cyclone. A 20-meter section of the brick compound wall collapsed entirely. In addition to other cyclone-related **repairs** on the school grounds, IDRF provided funds to **restore the compound wall**.

PROJECT SITE VISITS IN 2024

Project site visits by donors, the Board, and team members play a crucial role in strengthening IDRf's impact and fostering transparency. Direct interactions with beneficiaries and local leaders provide valuable insights that can shape future funding decisions, ensuring resources are allocated effectively. By facilitating these visits, IDRf enhances accountability, inspires greater donor engagement, and ultimately amplifies its ability to drive meaningful change.

PREMA AND ANIL GOGATE (CALIFORNIA) **Lila Poonawalla Foundation, Maharashtra**

Merit and need-based scholarships are provided by IDRf to academically deserving but financially disadvantaged females so they can pursue higher education.

The Gogate family has offered 145 young women financial assistance to pursue postgraduate degrees in science and engineering.



SHEELA AND JAIPAL RATHI (NEW JERSEY) **Savitri Soni Vidya Mandir, Uttar Pradesh**

With IDRf's vision and development strategy, the dream of an NRI to have a school in his native village of Nagauri has been fulfilled!



“ We had started this school in my village with two rooms and transported our students using bullock carts. It's heartwarming to see how far this institution has traveled over the last three decades, says Jaipal Rathi. ”

Today, with IDRf and the Rathi family's support, the CBSE-accredited school has expanded to grade 12, and 500 children from 30 villages receive quality education. Modern facilities like smart boards, CCTVs, science labs, playgrounds & six school buses have been provided.

GAYATHRI SEENUMANI (CALIFORNIA) **Swami Vivekananda Rural Development Society, Tamil Nadu**

IDRf has assisted in the establishment of STEM Tinker labs at the SVRDS Training Center in Ulundai.

80 middle school students from 3 villages participate in computer and science-related activities on Sunday mornings, thanks to the assistance of IDRf donor Gayathri Seenumani.

The project is currently in its second year of success.



NIMITA AND KISHORE SHAH (NEW JERSEY) Shri Jalaram Arogya Seva Trust, Gujarat

A larger and modern Smt. Shardaben Ramanlal Shah Memorial Hospital is being built in Meghraj with assistance from IDRF. This hospital will offer impoverished patients from rural and backward tribal areas top-notch medical care at a reduced or no cost.

Rajeev visited the IDRF-supported Kamayani School in Pune, which serves **550 children with mental disabilities**. The Siddh Divyang Foundation manages this school, and it employs technology-based platforms to teach academic subjects and career skills that foster students' cognitive growth.

He also visited the IDRF-supported Door Step School in Pune, which gives kids from buildings and slums access to a basic education. Each month, more than **200 children are reached by the 9 buses** that have been transformed into mobile classrooms.

VANDANA MATRAVADIA, OPERATIONS MANAGER, IDRF Vivekananda Kendra Arun Jyoti and Think Peace, Assam and Arunachal Pradesh, and Samerth Charitable Trust, Gujarat

Vandana met with beneficiaries of *Mission Shakti*: An Anemia Detection and Eradication Program in the remote mountain communities of Arunachal Pradesh. **3,650 anemic women in 43 villages** have received treatment from IDRF and Arun Jyoti-supported Mobile Medical Clinics over the project's three years, and they are now anemia-free.

On March 30th, 2024, IDRF donors and supporters from the Washington DC metro area came together in Gaithersburg, Maryland, for the launch of **Service Before Self: A Journey of Conviction, Courage and Commitment**, the inspiring memoir of IDRF's founder and CEO, Dr. Vinod Prakash.

The evening was a heartfelt tribute to Dr. Prakash's remarkable life—an immigrant's journey marked by resilience, the courage to confront adversity, and an unwavering commitment to social service. Despite losing his eyesight in 2010 due to medical negligence, Dr. Prakash, now in his 90s, continues to champion the cause of the underprivileged with unshakable dedication. His story is one of profound family values, a belief in 'duty' over 'rights,' and a deep-rooted calling to '*seva*' (service), which has empowered thousands over five decades.



YOUTH DRIVEN INITIATIVES FOR SOCIAL GOOD

Natasha Ambeskar and the **Surdaan Foundation** exemplify the profound impact that young minds can have when empowered with purpose, talent, and the drive to make a difference. Through music and philanthropy, these students are changing lives!

Natasha Ambeskar: Empowering Students in Rural India Through Mobility

In many parts of rural India, students face significant economic challenges that hinder their access to education. Public transportation is often unaffordable, forcing many children, especially girls, to undertake long and exhausting walks to school.

Many families struggle to afford bicycles, leaving students without a reliable means of commuting. Recognizing this critical need, **Natasha Ambeskar**, a student at The Basic Independent McLean in Virginia, organized a school-wide Holi celebration and fundraiser, rallying her community to provide bicycles to students at IDRF's partner, **Kusum Goel Dr. Santosh, Saraswati Vidya Mandir** in Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh.



Surdaan Foundation: Empowering Lives Through Music and Education

The **Surdaan Foundation** is a remarkable initiative founded by a group of passionate teenagers from the Alaap School of Music in Dallas, Texas. These young musicians, under the guidance of their teacher, Manjusha Hardiker, have combined their love for Hindustani classical music with a deep commitment to social change. Hardiker not only imparts the rich traditions of classical music but also mentors students in organizing musical performances to raise funds for children in need. Through their efforts, the foundation raised \$27,000, which was donated to two IDRF programs (**QUEST's Goshtarang Fellowship Program** and **Maharogi Sewa Samiti's Lok Biradari Junior College**) to provide education to underprivileged students in Maharashtra.

HELP WOMEN TAKE CHARGE & TRANSFORM LIVES: ENCOURAGE DIGITAL LITERACY Sewa Bharti, Delhi

With digital literacy becoming an essential skill in today's job market, IDRF is taking a significant step toward empowering underprivileged women in Paharganj, Delhi, by raising funds to establish a **digital literacy program** at the vocational center it helped set up in 2024. This initiative will offer computer courses lasting six months or a one-year diploma, benefiting 15-20 women per batch.

The estimated cost of setting up the center is approximately \$36,000, which includes \$20,000 in capital expenses and \$16,000 in operational costs. By equipping women with digital skills, IDRF aims to enhance their employability and open doors to better economic opportunities.

SUPPORT THE RECONSTRUCTION OF THE SPORTS WING OF THE WOMEN'S HOSTEL DAV College Trust and Management Society, New Delhi



Hans Raj Mahila Maha Vidyalaya, Jalandhar, Punjab, has long been a beacon of excellence in women's sports, producing remarkable athletes who have earned prestigious accolades like the Arjuna and Padmashri awards and competed at national and international levels.

However, the women's hostel sports wing, an essential space for aspiring athletes, is now in dire need of reconstruction. Due to its deteriorating condition, the facility has become unsafe for students.

To ensure these talented young women have the proper infrastructure to pursue their dreams, IDRF is raising funds to **rebuild the hostel wing**. The proposed renovation will cost approximately \$66,000 and will feature 19 rooms and restrooms, providing comfortable accommodation for 96 students.

TRANSFORM LIVES BY PROVIDING MENTAL HEALTH PATIENTS WITH CARE & SKILLS Blind People's Association (India), Gujarat

IDRF is committed to transforming lives by establishing a fully equipped **Mental Health Education Center** in the underserved areas of the Aravalli district, Gujarat. The center will feature four dormitories designed to house patients discharged from mental hospitals, offering them essential halfway home care services and medical therapies to support their rehabilitation journey. Beyond medical treatment, in-patients will receive vocational training, equipping them with skills to engage in productive activities and regain confidence for formal employment or self-employment opportunities.

Each year, this center is expected to empower 150 patients and their families. The estimated construction cost for the center is \$815,000, and naming rights for buildings in the center will be available to contributors who wish to leave a legacy. The center's annual operational expenses are projected to be \$28,000.
